Mugenkyo would like to extend a very special welcome to their teacher and inspiration,

Kurumaya-sensei of the legendary "Hibiki Taiko Drummers",

who has just arrived for an extended stay in the UK.

His performing career spans the last 30 years, and he has played a major part in reinvigorating Taiko in Japan and turning a traditional festival music into a highly polished art form. In Japan he is one of the top Taiko masters, reknown for his originality and vision, and he has pioneered new and exciting combinations of Taiko with other instruments and forms of music. Kurumaya-sensei has put all of his activities in Japan on hold - performances with Hibiki Taiko, teaching six different Taiko drum groups, solo performances with other musicians, in order to come to Britain to spread Taiko with Mugenkyo through workshops, classes and performances. We are extremely fortunate to have him here in the UK. He believes that Europe is the next frontier for Taiko drumming, and will be playing a major part in spreading Taiko in Europe.

## MUGENKYO: The Story So Far ...

It all began when Neil and Miyuki went to Japan in the summer of 1992, Miyuki to take up a teaching post in her mother's native country, and Neil to travel and see the country. Little did they know how this seemingly small step would change their lives. When in Fukui, on the underdeveloped west coast of Japan, Neil, an ex-rock drummer happened to chance upon a concert by the magnificent Hibiki Taiko Drummers, a local legend. The power of the drumming left Neil spellbound, "It was as if a lightning bolt had struck me". On meeting Kurumaya-sensei, the leader of the group, the master drummer shook Neil's hand and said, "You will be a Taiko player... in Britain." Neil was unconvinced, but nevertheless felt very grateful when Kurumaya-sensei offered to teach him this ancient art. Hibiki Daiko are based at the Daianzenji Zen Buddhist temple on the outskirts of Fukui, and it was here that Neil was made to practice on a cardboard drum in the early days, for hours on end, to learn the form. Running and weight training was also part of the discipline. The more Neil learned, the more he was drawn into the world of Taiko, and when his tourist visa ran out, he applied successfully for a cultural visa, which enabled him to stay for two years to study Taiko druming. To start with, the language barrier was not a problem, but as Neil progressed, it became more difficult for Kurumaya-sensei to communicate the subtler points of the lesson. So, Miyuki began going along to the lessons to translate. Gradually she too became more and more interested in Taiko, and eventually asked Kurumaya-sensei to teach her too, a big decision, as nothing less than 100% commitment would be accepted by the sensei (teacher). Their lessons continued, but never for a moment did they think that it would be possible to continue playing Taiko in Britain. At the end of their stay, they managed to buy a set of durms (thanks to a lot of hard work, help from their friends and supporters in Fukui, and a big discount at the Taiko factory) which they brought back to London on their return in autumn 1994. And so, Mugenkyo was born.

## MAY Brighton Festival

Our first UK performance and the scene of those immortal words uttered by an elderly man, "I can't stand this bloody noise, either you go or I go!" Luckily, we decided to carry on and not give it all up there and then.

## JULY James Whale Show, ITV

Our first TV appearance.. it's amazing how many people watched that programme.. haven't they got better things to do on a Friday night?! - we were invited back in November due to popular demand.

#### SEPT Taiko Classes

Neil begins several Taiko courses, discontinued due to noise complaints!

## SEPT Mugenkyo School Show

Neil and Miyuki begin touring a show for children, introducing Taiko drumming in a cultural context. Since their first year they have performed the show to over 20,000 children throughout Britain.

## NOV Paul Robeson Theatre, London

Our first full length concert - one and a half hours and only three drummers. Eat your hearts out Kodo!

## MAR Bridge Lane Theatre, London

A joint concert with Hibiki Daiko from Japan - a historic event: the first time a Japanese and British group have performed together. It was an amazing experience, the air was alive with electricity!

### APRIL Union Chapel, London

We were shocked to discover that part of the ceiling had fallen down during the show. This has happened quite often since then! Mugenkyo bring the roof down!

#### APRIL "The Radiant Life", London

A collaboration between Japanese composer Katsuhiro Uemura, Mugenkyo and a contemporary dance troupe at the Turtle Key Theatre, repeated again the following year.

#### MAY "Sargeant Kabuki Man NYPD"

We performed in Leicester Square at the film premier of this tacky Bmovie, with actors dressed up as the "Kabuki-man", monsters and a page 3 girl!

## JUNE Taiko Festival, Dusseldorf, Germany

The first Taiko festival in Europe took place place over two days, in which four groups took part: Mugenkyo from the UK, Tentekko from Germany, Hanadon from Holland, and Sacramento Taiko Dan from USA.



### JUNE "Japan Festival Award"

Mugenkyo were presented with an award for "outstanding achievements in furthering the understanding of Japanese culture in the United Kingdom.

### JUNE "Taiko Transformed", London

A project involving four schools where students were taught a Taiko piece, culminating in a performance at the Lillian Baylis Theatre using Taiko drums they had made themselves.

#### JULY Rhythm Sticks Festival, London

A festival held outside the Royal Festival Hall - the thunderous sound of the Taiko could be heard right up and down the Thames!

## OCT Mugenkyo return to Japan

A five week stay for study and performances, including a guest spot at Hibiki Taiko's 15th anniversary concert.



# Dazzling display of art from the heart

UNLIKE South American, African and Asian societies, drum culture has no importance in modern-day Europe, but Neil Mackie and his group Mugenkyo are determined to change that.

Mugenkyo is Britain's only Taiko drumming group and will perform its dazzling show at the Old Town Hall, Hemel Hempstead, on Friday.

Neil explains to PAUL . CHRONNELL the philosophy behind Talko drumming and why he believes it has a universal appeal

AIKO symbolises the heartbeat, which Neil Mackie calls "the natural rhythm of life'

When we are in the womb, we grow with the constant beating of our mother's heart. We are born with a natural rhythm but as we grow our primal senses withdraw," believes Neil. "Taiko drumming has its own

life force and when this life force and the true spirit within us meet, the basic natural rhythm within us all is awakened."

Britain's first professional Talko drum group, Mugenkyo has been collecting rave reviews as it drums its way around the country purveying its intriguing mix of

dynamic rhythms and visual art.
Having performed at venues
such as The Crucible in Sheffield,
The Bristol Old Vic and at the Glastonbury and Phoenix summer festivals, Mugenkyo brings the ancient traditional folk art of Taiko drumming to a new

After witnessing his first erformance in the Japanese city performance in the Japanese city of Fukui, founder member Neil Mackie spent two years learning Taiko before heading back to these shores to form Mugenkyo in Mugenkyo, Britain's only Taiko drumming group, brings this dynamic and captivating artform to Hemel Hempstead on Friday

"It was the most amazing thing I'd ever seen," said Neil. "It just blew me away and I decided I had to learn it. I didn't expect to stay for two years but that was just the way it worked out."

A big bonus for Friday night's
Hemel Hempstead audience will
be the presence within the group
of legendary Talko performer
Massald Kurumaya.
The group's teacher since it
was formed in 1994, Kurumaya is

the leader of one of Japan's most famous Taiko groups, Hibiki

respected Taiko performers in the world.

Neil is thrilled by his arrival.
"Everything I learnt, I learnt from him. It is an unbelievable

nam. It is an unbelievable
privilege to have him join
Mugenkyo," he said.

The group goes back to Japan
to tour and learn every year and
last year had the honour of performing in front of members of the Japanese Royal Family, an occasion which was broadcast on national TV.

Tailon which means drum, was first played at village festivals, temples and shrines and was used as part of ritualistic rice planting ceremonies in which villagers prayed for rain and protection from plagues, famines and other natural disasters.

It has only become a performing art during the past 30 to 40 years. Concentrating on movement and rhythm, the large drums nevertheless dominate the

proceedings.
"The drumming is very

powerful and your whole body is taken over by their sound when you are playing," said Neil.

The performance on Friday, April 24, starts at 7.30pm and tickets, priced at £7, are available from the Old Town Hall box office on 01442 228091
